HEALTHCARE PROGRAM

One of BBF’s core activities for many decades, our Healthcare Program is centered around collecting medical equipment and supplies primarily from our hospital and other types of medical donor partners. We send these donations, often along with pharmaceuticals, to medical facilities around the globe. In the first three quarters of 2023, BBF has sent the volume equivalent of 91 ocean-going container shipments to partners in 14 different countries. The pharmaceuticals and medical supplies supported local hospitals, clinics, and medical brigades. At the time of printing, BBF has equipped 36 Med-Surg trips in 2023.

Healthcare Program Highlight

MOBILE HEALTH PROGRAM

BBF’s Mobile Health program eliminates healthcare barriers in underserved communities. Vans are outfitted with specialized medical equipment and provide at-risk populations with specialized care at no cost to the patient.

Studies published on mobile health operating in the United States have shown them effective in managing chronic diseases, improving self-efficacy and boosting participation in recommended screenings. They also reduce healthcare costs by lowering the number of visits to emergency rooms.

BBF’s first mobile clinic was donated to the Eye and Ear Foundation of Pittsburgh, which supports a program that provides free eye care and diabetic retinopathy screenings to underserved communities in the Pittsburgh area. Ophthalmologists and medical students have used the van to host several clinics.

Detecting eye conditions early on is key in preventing vision loss, but, in many cases, patients don’t experience symptoms until after the condition has progressed. When patients receive regular eye exams, ophthalmologists can diagnose conditions in the early stages and intervene with treatments or surgeries that can prevent irreversible damage.

Mobile Clinics Success Stories

An elderly woman was living on the streets when she arrived at an eye clinic held in Downtown Pittsburgh in March. After being diagnosed with cataracts in both of her eyes, community health workers helped her schedule an appointment to receive surgery. One of her cataracts has already been removed; a second surgery is being scheduled.

At a vision clinic held this summer in Ambridge—a recovering steel town just north of Pittsburgh—one child was diagnosed with congenital ptosis, a drooping eye lid that can interfere with visual development. When left untreated, it can lead to permanent vision loss. Doctors at the clinic spotted the condition while there was still time to intervene.

Second Mobile Health Clinic Unveiled in Florida



In early September, Brother’s Brother Foundation unveiled its second mobile eye van at a ribbon-cutting ceremony held at Caridad Center, a free health clinic in Palm Beach County, Florida. Caridad Center is one of the largest free health care clinics in Florida and has more than 700 volunteer doctors, dentists, nurses and dental hygienists who provide free medical care to uninsured Palm Beach County residents living at or below 200% of the federal poverty line (annual income of \$29,160).

Laura Callus, CEO of the Caridad Center, said the clinic typically serves more than 5,000 people in the area and has 35,000 patient visits every year.

“We serve all sectors of our community that need us, from all corners of this county. For many of them, transportation is the number one barrier to access to care. With the generous donation from the Brother’s Brother Foundation, we are able to provide our first mobile eye clinic here at Caridad.” **Laura Callus, CEO of the Caridad Center**

Two additional Mobile Health Clinics (MHC)s are nearly complete and will be donated to Allegheny Health Network (Primary Care MHC) and Kentucky Care (Primary Care MHC), which operates Federally Qualified Health Centers in rural Kentucky.

Healthcare Partner Story

The 2023 Mezu Foundation Medical Mission to Nigeria was a remarkable and heartwarming experience for all involved. This was our 20th International Medical Mission.

The event saw a diverse range of patients seeking medical care, from cardiology to internal medicine, optometry, and medication dispensing at the pharmacy. The atmosphere was filled with enthusiasm and eagerness as doctors and student interns from prestigious institutions like Federal University of Technology Owerri and Abia State University College of Optometry Uturu collaborated to learn and provide much-needed assistance.

Much thanks to partner companies including Brother's Brother Foundation whose donations of free medications helped make our mission a success. We thank the Brother's Brother Foundation for their help and support.



The dedication and selflessness of the volunteers and student interns were truly commendable. They tirelessly worked together, triaging and attending to patients with various conditions, gaining invaluable practical experience in dealing with different aspects of the human anatomy.

The opportunity to observe medical experts work was an enriching experience for the student interns, as they absorbed knowledge and honed their skills.

The impact of the medical mission was evident by the overwhelming turnout of patients. Hundreds of people, many of whom had been suffering from untreated conditions, received attention and care.

The final year optometry student interns played a crucial role in addressing eye-related issues such as cataracts, glaucoma, pterygium, macular problems, and dry eyes. Shockingly, around 89% of the population examined had significant lens changes, with approximately 40% requiring surgical intervention, underscoring the importance of such missions.

Beyond optometry, the medical mission also catered to other medical needs, with specialists in cardiology, infectious diseases, and pediatrics providing their expertise. Additionally, a resident pharmacist worked tirelessly to dispense free medications to all attendees, ensuring that no one left the event without the necessary treatments.

One of the most rewarding aspects of the medical mission was witnessing the joy on the faces of those who received help. Giving back to the community and making a difference in the lives of the disadvantaged and marginalized brought immense warmth to everyone's hearts.

“My heart is full of joy, I got everything free. I cook with firewood and the heat hurts my chest and my eyes. My cough and arthritis pain were treated and my eyes examined, and I received my medications free. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.” Mrs. Florence, an elderly patient who walked ten miles to reach the medical site.

BLOSSOMING BEYOND: CELEBRATING SECOND CHANCES BREAST CANCER FUND

The Brother’s Brother Foundation Breast Cancer Fund was started in October of 2021 by Laura Kelly, BBF’s Vice President of Communications and Development, following her own diagnosis of Stage III Invasive Breast Cancer.

The fund has supported patients undergoing treatment for breast or prostate cancer at the infusion center at St. Luke’s Montefiore Hospital in New York—where Laura also received treatment—and Ribbons of Love, a program that provides medical treatment to women battling cancer in Honduras. Most recently, BBF’s Breast Cancer Fund provided a grant to support a breast cancer imaging program led by RAD-AID, a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving access to medical imaging and radiology in countries with underdeveloped healthcare.

This year the program has expanded to support and offer resources for those who have recently completed treatments as well. The Blossoming Beyond campaign is dedicated to funding post-recovery support that empowers breast cancer survivors to flourish in their new chapters of life.

“It takes a significant amount of resources for a person to regain their health following breast cancer treatment, and supportive care is not always prioritized following the conclusion of treatments. Many cannot afford the extra expenses associated with post-surgery counseling or therapy. Supportive services are essential in recovery—both physical and emotional healing—and are associated with better overall outcomes.” Laura Kelly, VP of Communications and Development

We have introduced several different ways to support the Breast Cancer Fund, each named after a flower that symbolizes strength. The daffodil, tulip, and iris are bulb flowers that blossom in the spring following challenging and difficult winter conditions. Healthcare Program Highlight

NEWBORN SCREENING IN LATIN AMERICA

Brother’s Brother Foundation, in partnership with neurologists at Boston Children’s Hospital and their colleagues at the Instituto de Nutricion y Tecnologia de los Alimentos (INTA), Universidad de Chile, is working to acquire a mass spectrometer for newborn screenings in Chile. The mass spectrometer is a critical piece of medical equipment that can identify and subsequently help manage often life-altering health issues. By testing the blood from a heel stick from newborn babies, one test can be used to identify more than 40 different metabolic diseases. With early detection, these diseases can be effectively managed and treated – leading to healthy and normal development in babies.

In the United States, tandem mass spectrometry has been used in every newborn screening since 2007. However, it is estimated that less than one-third of newborns worldwide have access to any screening test.

While newborn screening ultimately saves more money by preventing hospitalizations and severe disabilities, startup costs are very high. This prevents many public health systems from being able to afford them.

BBF is working with with physicians, nutritionists, and public health officials to close this important health inequity gap. By defraying start-up costs of the expanded newborn screening, we can help to give newborn babies and their families a chance to live out their best life.



INFRASTRUCTURE

Our Infrastructure Program focuses on the areas of solar power and WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene). Creating reliable, clean, and affordable access to energy provides security to communities in need leading to a prosperous future for all.

Brother's Brother Foundation has been working with partners to help install solar panel systems since 2015 in Liberia and since then has grown in size and scope. In the first three quarters of 2023, Brother's Brother Foundation supported infrastructure projects in Puerto Rico, Ghana, Liberia and Zambia.

The most important life sustaining element that every person requires is access to clean water. Brother's Brother Foundation is furthering our commitment to sustainable development through our Infrastructure Program WASH. This program aims to reduce the risk and spread of water-borne illness while increasing access to clean water and hygiene education.



Partner Story

2023 has been an exciting year for Hope for Ghana as we reach new heights, in large part because of the incredible partnership with Brother's Brother Foundation. A strong relationship forged at the end of 2021 has been built on the similar visions of a grassroots charity on the ground in Africa and a foundation looking to foster sustainable change overseas. Brother's Brother Foundation's fingerprints are all over the work that Hope for Ghana takes such pride in.

In March 2023 Hope for Ghana opened its third school that already has over 250 children from kindergarten to sixth grade enrolled. This modern eight classroom school has enormous gifts from Brother's Brother Foundation including a water borehole and purification machine providing clean, potable water to the school and the community, solar power, and a state of the art computer lab. The community is so excited about the potential growth in this rapidly growing school that we are now planning for the addition of a junior high school.

On the heels of this exciting project, Hope for Ghana continued to give the gift of life, providing clean, potable water in remote villages where women and children previously had walked long distances to fetch dirty water, ensuring a community's most basic need while significantly reducing waterborne disease. We were thrilled to take our water mission to a new level this year thanks to the benevolence of Brother's Brother Foundation. The village of Ahlihadzi, where drilled water had been found to be undrinkable because of several impurities, now has their water going through a reverse osmosis purification machine ensuring the highest standard of clean, potable water, with all electricity provided by solar power.

Pure water at no cost to the village is sustainability at its best, all thanks to the immense generosity of Brother's Brother Foundation. Our biggest water project ever is a testament to how a wonderful partnership is saving lives here in Ghana. Truly this special gift has changed a village forever. May clean water flow and may it never cease.



As all of this was going on, Brother's Brother Foundation was packing up another medical shipment bound for Ghana. BBF's second shipment of desperately needed medical supplies arrived in Ghana's port in April 2023.

Twelve maternity delivery tables, 18 hospital beds and mattresses, several surgical instrument trays, 7 medical carts and thousands of disposable medical supplies were waiting to change the landscape of healthcare delivery in Ghana.


Clearing this 40' container from Ghana's port may have been the hardest project I've ever worked on in Ghana, but I was choked up with tears watching the joy that came from the long awaited arrival of Brother's Brother Foundation's medical shipment in mid-July. I couldn't have said it any better than Senyo, our Vice President of Operations, as he beautifully reflected the gratitude and joy of Hope for Ghana and his people: "We are so grateful for this donation. You are transforming lives. You are changing the face of medical health in Ghana. You are transforming the whole of Ghana!"

It was an unforgettable, emotional day celebrating the gift of life, as we later officially handed over Brother's Brother Foundation's generous medical supplies shipment on August 1. A king, chiefs, members of Ghana Health Service, doctors and nurses gratefully received the 8,200 pounds of medical supplies with sheer joy. Thank you Brother's Brother Foundation for transforming healthcare delivery in Ghana.

This is philanthropy at its best. This is what a beautiful collaboration and true partnership can bring to the world. Thank you Brother's Brother Foundation for your love and commitment to our mission and the beautiful people of Ghana. You allow us all to dream big. You especially allow Ghanaians to dream big. You truly do change the whole of Ghana!

UPDATE ON PARTNERSHIP WITH HOPE FOR GHANA

This fall BBF funded a project to install a borehole and reverse osmosis machine at Hope for Ghana's fourth school, Klokpe School of Hope. Upon completion, the school will have 12 classrooms and teach kindergarten through 12th grade. Dr. Greene expects the school to attract roughly 300 children from Klokpe and the surrounding villages. Some of these children have been learning underneath a tree or in a shed.



Infrastructure Program in Zambia

An estimated 42% of families in rural Zambia do not have access to clean water, according to a survey conducted by Zambia's Ministry of Health.

From a health standpoint, the consequences are clear: diarrheal diseases, many of which are caused from waterborne illness, are among the country's leading causes of death.

Zoom out, though, and there are other repercussions that can devastate entire families and economies. Most people in rural Zambia rely on farming for their source of food and income. Without access to a clean and consistent source of water, they depend on rainfall to provide enough sustenance for their crops—but shifting weather patterns have made it a less reliable source.

Pittsburgh-based nonprofit organization Music in World Cultures drilled two water boreholes to improve access to clean water in Chipembi, a village in Zambia's Central province. The project came with challenges – it took 300 feet of drilling before groundwater was reached.

Using a handpump to retrieve water that far down into the earth— a distance equivalent to six semi-truck trailers bumper to bumper— creates a significant barrier, especially for children and elderly.

Brother's Brother Foundation funded a project that installed two water tanks, making water retrieval significantly easier.

Both boreholes in Chipembi are situated near private farms. In addition to reducing cases of waterborne illness, they will also foster more reliable harvesting seasons.

DISASTER RESPONSE

BBF’s Disaster Response program focuses on working hand-in-hand with first responders and relief agencies in the affected areas to provide ongoing support. This includes the sourcing and staging of resources, creating partnerships with transportation networks, and working with local partners and other VOADs (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster), along with engaging with volunteers to sort and send disaster relief supplies.

In the first three quarters of 2023, BBF has provided grants, medication, healthcare equipment, and humanitarian supplies for relief and recovery efforts in the USA and seven other countries. These disasters included tornadoes in Alabama, Arkansas, and Mississippi; the Hawaii wildfires; flooding in Vermont; the train derailment in Ohio; and Hurricane Idalia in Florida. BBF also continues to support relief work in Ukraine. We have supplied critically needed medications, medical supplies, and humanitarian relief to those impacted in Ukraine itself and to refugees.



Hawaii Wildfire Response

DONATION AIDS CLEANUP

Brother’s Brother Foundation sent 11 pallets of hard hats and respirator face masks to the Maui Relief Storage Facility in Honolulu, Hawaii as part of our ongoing response to the wildfires.

Opened by Hawaii’s Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, the 30,000 square foot storage facility collects and sorts donations for wildfire victims. Makana o Ke Akua, an Oahu-based nonprofit organization, oversees warehouse operations and distributes the supplies to Maui residents when they are ready to receive them.

BBF’s shipment contained more than 500 hard hats, 4,700 P100 respirator masks and 5,000 P100 respirator cartridges donated by MSA Safety. The value of the donation exceeded \$150,000. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, P100 respirators filter 99.97% of airborne particles.

BBF’s previous shipments to Maui supplied on-the-ground partners with baby formula and hygiene kits to distribute to wildfire victims. We also provided grants to support the relief efforts of several Hawaiian nonprofits, including the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement.

GRANT ADDRESSES MENTAL HEALTH FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN



Brother’s Brother Foundation provided a grant to Maui Prep to hire a psychologist to help students process trauma. The psychologist developed impactful relationships with students and teachers by volunteering her services in the disaster’s aftermath. The grant will fund her part-time salary for the entire school year.

BBF’s grant to Maui Prep is the first step in a larger initiative to address mental health needs in Maui. Currently, we are working with The Queen’s Health System to develop a program that will allow children and adolescents to access specialized mental health services long term. The Queen’s Health System operates several hospitals in Hawaii and offers extensive psychiatric and behavioral health services.

US Disaster Response

Tornadoes in Arkansas

BBF provided a grant to the Arkansas Food Bank.

East Palestine, Ohio Train Derailment

BBF sent requested bottled water for residents impacted by the train derailment.

Vermont Floods

BBF provided a grant to Capstone Community Action, a non-profit organization headquartered in Barre, VT, that helps people in crisis access food, housing and job training. BBF also sent hygiene kits and tarps for Capstone to distribute to flood victims.

Hurricane Idalia, Florida

BBF provided a grant to Second Harvest Food Bank of the Big Bend.

Tornadoes in Alabama

BBF sent a shipment of hygiene kits, tarps, and other materials along with a cash grant to the Montgomery Area Food Bank.

Tornadoes in Mississippi

BBF shipped water, hygiene kits, tarps, and other disaster relief materials to the Humphreys County Emergency Management Agency.

International Disaster Response

At the time of printing, BBF has responded to natural diasters in Morocco, Turkey, Syria, Malawi, Libya, and Haiti.

Malawi, Tropical Cyclone Freddy

In response to Tropical Cyclone Freddy, BBF provided a grant to Mulanje Mission Hospital to aid in their recovery efforts after Tropical Cyclone Freddy caused widespread flooding, destruction, and loss of life.

Haiti, Earthquakes and Flooding

Brother’s Brother Foundation responded to the back-to-back disasters by providing a grant to long-time partner Food For the Poor. Funds were used to assemble and distribute 144 resealable five-gallon buckets filled with cleaning supplies that include laundry detergent, scouring pads, work gloves, heavy-duty trash bags, N95 masks, a clothesline and clothespins, air freshener spray, and reusable wipes.

BBF also air-shipped 35,000 pairs of industrial gloves and 690 hygiene kits to Food For The Poor’s office in Port-au-Prince, Haiti’s capital city. Assembled by volunteers at BBF’s warehouse in Pittsburgh, each hygiene kit contains everyday essentials such as shampoo and toothpaste, tissues, and feminine hygiene products.

Turkey and Syria, Earthquakes

BBF’s immediate response was to provide cash grants to three longstanding partners, Catholic Relief Services, Life for Relief and Development, and the Syrian American Medical Society Foundation (SAMS). We sent SAMS an air shipment of medical, surgical, and wound care supplies to Adana, Turkey for Syrian medical facilities purchased 300 insulated, family sized tents and 200 blankets to Life for Relief and Development. BBF also provided funds for the

purchase of twelve container homes equipped with furniture and appliances needed to house a family of four, including a toilet, shower, refrigerator and washing machine. These homes were stocked with everyday necessities and built in DEIK Town, an initiative aimed at building 1,000 container homes by May. Long-time GIK partner Food for the Poor provided BBF with a \$50,000 grant to support these efforts.



Ukraine Update

Brother’s Brother Foundation’s response to the crisis in Ukraine began in March, 2022 and is ongoing. Current efforts include shipments of medications, supplies and equipment; funding for mental health programs; providing humanitarian relief to those impacted in Ukraine and refugees in Poland; and working with prosthetics clinics.

To date, we have flown more than 550 pallets (equal to 28 shipping containers) of relief supplies to Ukraine.

UKRAINE NEUROLOGY FUND

Brother’s Brother Foundation has been supplying critical medications to treat epilepsy and other neurological conditions to children and adults in Ukraine. We ship medications directly to trusted neurologists on the ground, which are then distributed to hospitals and directly into the hands of patients at home. In addition, we supply medical equipment for the treatment of neurological illness, such as EEG machinery, ultrasounds and neurorehabilitation equipment to Ukrainian hospitals and rehabilitation centers around the country. Since the beginning of the war, we have sent over \$200,000 in neurology based medication and \$300,000 in equipment, with new shipments being sent out regularly.

OPERATION RENEW PROSTHETICS

Operation Renew Prosthetics (ORP) is a program run by Medical Center Orthotics and Prosthetics (MCOP) to provide prosthetics for Ukrainian soldier amputees injured in the ongoing war in Ukraine. The program operates out of MCOP’s offices on the east coast of the United States and through its European facility in Malta. Two other partners, Future for Ukraine (FFU) and Revived Soldiers Ukraine (RSU), are assisting with transporting, housing, and feeding the soldiers and their traveling companions.

EDUCATION

BBF’s Education Program began with publishers donating books to us for recipients in countries around the world. The program has since grown to working with local communities to help repair schools damaged by disasters, installing solar power panels, providing refurbished computers along with educational software, and providing sporting equipment for a holistic learning experience.

In 2023, with the help of our partners, BBF has supported education programs and sent education shipments to partners around the world as well as in the Pittsburgh area.





Bridging the Digital Divide in Pittsburgh

Brother's Brother Foundation donated 100 Dell laptops and over 300 smartphones to BootUp PGH, a Pittsburgh-based non-profit organization that teaches children the skills they need to enter a professional setting after high school.

Amil Cook is the Director of Technology Education at Locally Grown, BootUP PGH's parent organization, and has taught technology at the high school level for more than 10 years. He says that, for today's graduates, "the expectation is that Windows is second nature," but many don't have access to Windows operating systems in schools. Instead, students are given Chromebooks, which are really just "glorified web browsers."




"Having these Windows devices, it opens up our community to a whole new professional class of

apps and services that are essential for them to procure employment, advance their entrepreneurial goals, and basically function in modern society." **Amil Cook, Director of Technology Education**

BootUp PGH partners with Pittsburgh Public Schools to bring technology devices into classrooms and teach students how to use them—a facet of their program made possible through a donation of 110 iPads from BBF in the spring of 2022. The donation, received shortly after BootUP PGH was launched, enabled the organization to teach students how to use iPads in two classrooms simultaneously.

"It's been a powerful, powerful donation," Cook said.
